For good reproduction on an A4 page from a PDF or to display the newsletter on screen, an image reduced to fit within 1920x1080 pixels is way big enough. There would be no improvement in perceptible image quality with a higher count image.

Also, when sending a photo direct from your phone, if the system offers you the option of sending **full sized** or **reduced**, please choose **reduced**. Again, plenty big enough with a modern multi-megapixel phone!

Congratulations to David Woodcock (GMAPS)



I am so pleased to be able to announce that David Woodcock has been awarded the Australian Photographic Society (APS) honour of GMAPS (Grand Master Australian Photographic Society)

APS awards photographers who achieve various milestones by entering their images into national and international competitions.

Before a person can apply for GMAPS they have had to achieve 4 other levels. LAPS (Licentiate APS), AAPS (Associate APS), FAPS (Fellow APS), and MAPS (Master APS), usually across 4 to 5 years.

To achieve GMAPS David had to receive 300 **new international** acceptances using **new images** (i.e. nothing that he has used before), a minimum of 20 acceptances from Australian internationals and a minimum of 20 different titles (images) obtaining awards from 9 different countries.

The following Chart helps explain the various levels and their associated requirements before a person can be awarded each honour.

Mysteries of Photography #5: Black and White Conversion

Most of us live in a world of colour but Black and White (monochrome) images are appreciated by many or most of us and it is not just something that has been learned. If you go into the dark, the colour receptors in our eyes (the cones) switch off and the panchromatic receptors (rods) take over and we have no perception of colour. (Don't try to choose a shirt in a dimly lit walk-in robe, you might get a shock when you walk outside!)


There is nothing inherently "unnatural" about an image without colour.

While we now all have cameras that capture images in colour, it would be hard to argue that some images look good with the colour removed. The question is, what is the best way to do


this?

Let's make a test system with black, white and the gamut of colours constructed using the HSL colour model. (HSL: Hue Saturation Lightness). Why use HSL? Use it because it is easy to choose the colour you want for your colour patch. Below, you can see how the red and green patches have been colorized. Simply choose the colour on the Hue slider, set saturation to 100% and Lightness to 50%. The others were done exactly the same way but with the Hue slider moved to appropriate part of the colour spectrum.

Every HSL colour patch has an equivalent RGB value. It is just easier to set this all up using HSL.




This is now our test system to see how best to do a B&W conversion. Let's desaturate the image using the HSL Adjustment by moving the saturation slider to 0%. (All examples done using Affinity Photo)



We now have a B&W image but where is the differentiation between all the colours? Definitely not a good way to do an optimal B&W conversion!


Let's try another way. Let's try the B&W Adjustment instead. Disaster!



Now all the colour patches are pure white!

There must be a better way. Our eyes (and brain) register different colours as having different intensities. We are most sensitive to green, less so to red and the least to blue. The formula for sensitivities is:

Let's apply this to our B&W Adjustments.



For yellow that lies between red and green on the spectrum, the slider has been set as the sum of the sensitivities for red plus green (i.e. yellow equals 30% + 59%). Similarly for cyan and magenta. With our B&W sliders set like this, we now have a distinct differentiation between the different colours.

This does not mean that every B&W conversion should use these values for each of the sliders. However, it is a good place to start.

In practice, adjust each slider to bring out features that to you produces the most pleasing result in your particular image. However, the primary take home message is *don't just use a standard monochrome conversion!*

This article is completely based on an Affinity Photo tutorial available on YouTube presented by a young lady called Ally. Try it Photoshop and tell me if you get a different result!

Member Profile...Introducing...... RUSSELL MONSON

My earliest recollection of interest in photography was in my primary school years (maybe earlier). My father's camera was a Kodak Autographic Brownie (a roll film, bellows style camera with a stylus which could be used to annotate each or any exposure directly onto the film through a slot in the back.) This was the only camera in our family until my sister bought her own after she started work.

My first experience of taking photos on my own was using a camera borrowed from my brother to document an interstate trip while at university. It was shortly after this that I bought my own, a Minolta SRT Super (also known as SRT 301) with a 50mm prime lens.

I joined the Warragul Camera Club in the mid-70s and continued until work and family changed the focus of my photography to recording family events and family holidays.

My first digital camera a 2Mp digital Canon purchased for a trip across China to the UK in 2003. Lots of fun capturing market scenes, street scenes and landscapes recharged my interest in photography. The instant availability of images was also a new feature – digital was new here, but very new in western China, and on more than one occasion my camera was taken by the subject of a market shot so that he / she could show their friends the photos that had just been taken.

Roll forward to 2012 and having retired from full time work a while earlier, I rejoined the Warragul Camera Club.

Family and travel continue to be a focus for photography (in fact I think you could say that photography is a focus for the travel – being fortunate to be able to enjoy travel in Australia and overseas). Monthly competitions stretch my imagination and repertoire of images, as more often than not the back catalogue from family and travel doesn't fit the definitions. Entry into National and other competitions (such as in Australian Photography) also challenge my work in terms of time and subject matter, but it is always a buzz to gain an acceptance (or better) from any judge.

One of the benefits of digital photography is the instantaneous outcome. I like to try and get the image 'right' in the camera, and not rely / resort to heavy manipulation to produce the desired outcome.

Sharing a passion for photography with Carol, and her experience and knowledge of the visual arts, has stimulated and educated my eye for subject matter, the club and competing in competitions are the main drivers and resources of my development as a photographer / artist. Studying for the Advanced Diploma of Photography at Photography Studies College provided an added structure to my learning, with many opportunities to extend both skill and knowledge. Club workshops and outings, impromptu outings with other club members, and a partner with a shared interest in both photography and travel makes it a lot easier to get out there and take photos.

Make sure your name is clearly marked on all your packaging. We do our best to look after your images but it's up to you to ensure your images are travel safe. The folio bags you get from Office Works, or the like are great for unframed images but not big enough for framed images.
