



Mysteries of Photography #16: Exif

Every digital image file contains information about that image. This is part of the **Exchangeable image file format** (Exif). This was originally formulated for TIFF image files but has been extended JPG, PNG, WEBP, DCF (RAW) and even WAV (sound files).

This is called metadata. The following is a direct quote from the Wikipedia entry:

The metadata tags defined in the Exif standard cover a broad spectrum:

- Camera settings: This includes static information such as the camera model and make, and information that varies with each image such as orientation (rotation), aperture, shutter speed, focal length, metering mode, and ISO speed information
- Image metrics: Pixel dimensions, resolution, colorspace, and file size
- Date and time information, digital cameras will record the current date and time and save this in the metadata
- Location information
- A thumbnail for previewing the picture on the camera's LCD screen, in file managers, or in photo manipulation software
- Descriptions
- Copyright information

Also, if the camera or smartphone has GPS, this would also be included, showing the exact location of the image.

When you process your image, you can set in the software how much of this information is included in the processed (exported) file. Obviously you will always want to include your copyright information. But what about the rest?

GPS information may be problematic. You may not want your home address available in any images that you captured at home. However, with wildlife photography, it can be used to validate that that lion was in the wilds of Kenya, not Werribee.

There is also what, in my opinion, is a totally misguided tendency to remove all camera metadata from images entered into club competitions. The judge is there to help improve your work. If they can look up the full camera metadata (shutter speed, ISO, aperture, etc.), they may be able to make specific suggestions as to how an image capture might have been improved.

The advent of AI generated images is also raising a major red flag. I have just become aware that organisers of international photographic competition are not just warning that anyone entering AI generated images will be banned for life but also examining Exif data in at least the top ranked images in their competitions.

I know of one highly ranked image that at the last moment was excluded from an international competition as being a suspect AI generated image due to the absence of Exif information. From its appearance, it could also have just been a highly processed composite where the maker had set Photoshop to strip any Exif from the final exported JPG. We will never know.

Please be warned. If you like to make composite images, for your own sake, leave some Exif data in your JPG competition entry if you can. All is really poisoning the well, so to speak, for anyone who likes to experiment with their images.

Also, in club competitions, don't worry about revealing your photo secrets by leaving in your camera metadata. Any experienced judge will be able to make at least a highly educated guess as to how you achieved that technically brilliant image.

Warragul Camera Club National

National Event Policy

Purpose: To guide the Warragul Camera Club Inc in planning for a National Competition and Exhibition in a transparent and efficient manner

Guidelines: This policy sets the framework for establishing the sub-committee responsible to the committee of management (the committee) for the planning and conduct of an accredited National Competition.

Successful planning and implementation of an event of this scale and status

- requires substantial member support.
- is a long-term commitment to a 12 month timeline
- requires management by the sub-committee and oversight by the committee.

Item 43 of the Club Rules provides:

- 1. The Committee may delegate to a member of the Committee, a sub-committee or staff, any of its powers and functions ...
- 2. The delegation must be in writing and may be subject to the conditions and limitations the Committee considers appropriate.
- 3. The Committee may, in writing, revoke a delegation wholly or in part.

The Committee will normally depend heavily on the findings and recommendations of its sub-committees, although final decisions to accept or reject these recommendations will be made by the Committee.

A National Competition and Exhibition is a major undertaking for the club. Where community sponsorship / funding is obtained, and where it curtails further opportunities for the club to access this funding, it is reasonable that the event carry an operating surplus to support the club's operation.

Implementation:

1. Establish membership support for the Club to conduct a National Competition

A general meeting business item to determine members' support for the conduct of a National in the following calendar year. (June competition night)

(This resolution should have 75% member support, with 50% making themselves available for some aspect of the implementation)

2. Committee of Management (June meeting) determines level of club support and engagement, and if appropriate, calls for Expressions of interest in being on the National Sub-committee, with particular reference to key roles.

Key roles include

- a. Chairperson (coopted to committee if not already)

 Secretary

 Treasurer (usually the Club Treasurer)

 Print Competition Coordinator

 Exhibition Coordinator
- b. Sponsorship Coordinator
- c. Digital Competition and Data Coordinator (inc entries website)

 Social Media / Website coordinator

 Publicity / Marketing Coordinator
- 3. The Committee of Management reviews level of club support and engagement, and if there is appropriate support, appoints Sub-committee. (July Committee meeting)

The chairperson should be a member of the Club Committee of Management (either by election or appointment / cooption)

- 4. The appointed National Sub-committee should meet regularly, but only as necessary, providing written reports to each meeting of the Club Committee of Management
- **5.** Each year the Sub-committee will develop a timeline for key stages for the planning and implementation of the event. Once endorsed by the committee, all reports should indicate progress toward these stages.
- **6.** As the body responsible for effective management of the club, the committee's role is to accept, reject or modify the recommendations from the Sub-committee, or to direct the Sub-committee to particular action.

Evaluation & Review:

The Committee will review the policy at the conclusion of the National each year and make recommendations to the May WCC Committee meeting.

Adopted by the Committee on 11th April 2025



Post-Processing Workshop – Monday 12th May Global and selective colour adjustments

How conscious of colour are you when composing an image? Very likely most of us have used something red or yellow (e.g. a person wearing a brightly coloured jacket) as a point of focus to draw the viewer's attention. Giving thought to colour at the time of capture is one of the keys to producing a compelling image, The recent Triadic Colour Competition was a good example of the impact a carefully thought-out intentional approach to using colour can have.

However, it doesn't end with the click of the shutter but continues into post-processing. Even if your processing is minimal, I imagine you have at some time adjusted the colour temperature of an image or increased the overall saturation to give it more punch. Global colour adjustments can be applied to an image in several ways, but it is when you combine masks with selective colour adjustments that a more refined image is possible.

In the **Workshop on Monday, 12th May via Zoom commencing at 7:30pm** I will attempt to demonstrate global and selective colour adjustments, and the key role masks play in that.

The first part will review the masking features that have been added to Lightroom in the last year or so. One of the most significant AI masking tools was only released in the past few weeks.

The second part will look in detail at the ways to edit colour in Lightroom.

I will be using Lightroom Classic (LrC) for the workshop, but all the features covered are also available in Lightroom (Lr) and Camera Raw (Cr). Similar effects may be possible in other post-processing applications,

Although there is no limit on numbers, please register as usual for this workshop. It helps me to know who will be participating.
